## **Course Description**

The focus of this course is building on the reading fluency and vocabulary skills established in English II and VI. Students will continue to read texts from the humanities, and the physical and social sciences, in order to further develop reading speed, comprehension, use of reading strategies, and recognition and use of academic vocabulary. They will also further develop their ability to make inferences, and to critically analyze and discuss a variety of genres. The course will also include a focus on extensive reading beyond the classroom, with a focus on fiction to further their reading fluency.
