What is Taiken?

Taiken, especially in this pamphlet, means to experience traditional Japanese culture. In Fukui, you can participate in various local art, craft, and other cultural traditions. These traditions are preserved and kept alive through the efforts of local people, and joining a taiken is one way for you to contribute to the preservation of these traditions while expanding your own cultural experience at the same time. Through this pamphlet, we hope you become interested in Fukui traditional culture and start planning a visit to Fukui to enjoy some of the taiken introduced in these pages. Yatte miyossa!

What is 4572457?

"やってみよっさ (Yatte miyossa)" means "Let's try!" in Fukui dialect. Putting "っさ (ssa)" at the end of a sentence is a feature of Fukui dialect, particularly when people invite someone to do something. So "っさ (ssa)" can be translated as "Let's" in English.



Sitting Zen

What is Sitting Zen?

Try to do zazen (sitting zen) with real monks in the beautiful mountains east of Fukui City at Eiheiji Temple. This temple was founded by Zen Master Dögen in 1244. Zazen is not about obtain-



ing a certification of spiritual enlightenment, but rather it is the fundamental practice at Eiheiji Temple. Enlightenment is important, but it is not something to be obtained after participating in a single session of zazen.

There are two types of zazen taiken at Eiheiji Temple: full-lotus position and half-lotus position. When you practice zazen, you make a cosmic mudra with your hands. Each person has a different physical form and constitution, so it's best to find a way to sit without straining too much.

You will find calm and peace when you practice zazen at Eiheiji Temple.





- You will find calm and peace in the beautiful and quiet nature surrounding the temple.
- •You can experience zazen in English by reservation. (If you speak Japanese, you do not have to reserve.)
- You can stay at Eiheiji Temple for one night and experience zazen practice with monks.

Ishidajima-Teori

What is Ishidajima-Teori?

Ishidajima-Teori (Ishidajima handweaving) is a textile that is a traditional cotton craft of Fukui and has been designated as an intangible cultural property of Sabae City, having over one hundred years of history. It has a striped pattern and is characterized by its warmth, lightness, and breathability.



It was once used as an everyday material for items such as school kimonos in Fukui, especially in Sabae City. Recently, the Sabae Fiber Association was founded to preserve this traditional culture. In this taiken activity, you can experience making this traditional textile under the guidance of local volunteers at the facility. Textile weaving is simple. You will first select your threads and set them on

the loom. Then, you operate the traditional machine with your hands and feet. With a little practice, you can weave your first textile. Our recommendation is to make a colorful coaster for your drinks!

Glass blowing

What is Glass blowing?

Make your trip to Fukui more fun by trying glass blowing. In this taiken, you will make glass art by yourself, and the professional staff will help you create your own piece of artwork.



The professional artisans will teach you how to use the tools and materials as well as demonstrate the methods. You can make glass art in the atelier, which is in Kanazu Sousaku no Mori — a very scenic setting. Glass art is flourishing in Japan, and there are many glass art studios around Japan, such as *Edo Kiriko* in Tokyo and *Ryukyu* glass in Okinawa. The *taiken* process begins by attaching molten glass to a long bar called *fukizao* (blow pipe), and then blowing the glass from the opposite side of the bar. Finally, you will tint the glass any color you like. Next, you attach it



to another long stick and shape the glass, and then your work is complete. It is a little bit difficult to make a perfect shape the first time, but even if the shape is a little twisted and distorted, it will be your own personal artwork.

Echizen Washi

What is **Echizen Washi**?

Echizen Washi, which is traditional Japanese paper from Fukui, is a cultural asset because of the delicate manual methods used during the production process. Echizen Washi Village is surrounded by clean water and lush forests, and is said to be blessed by the washi goddess Kawakami-gozen.

You can experience making washi and shop for fine washi products in a place called Papyrus House. In this taiken, you will scoop and swing a framed screen using raw material to make washi. After creating your own original washi products, you can visit the Udatsu Museum and Workshop to see local craftsmen making washi in the traditional way, and learn about washi history and culture.







- •Choose to make nine different kinds of products, including postcards, Japanese fans (*Uchiwa*), and coasters.

Sumi-Nagashi

What is Sumi-Nagashi?

How about enjoying a Japanese culture experience with over 1,500 years of history? Sumi-Nagashi is a Japanese traditional craft that began 1,500 years ago. It was a form of entertainment for court nobility, and originated with these court nobles dipping a color-filled writing brush, called fude in Japanese, into a river and enjoying the intricate patterns borne from the flowing of the river with the colors. Eventually Japanese traditional paper, or washi, was introduced into the process in order to capture the patterns created by the confluence of color and river. For this taiken, you will pour pure, natural water from the local Otaki area into a small box. Next, you will dip a color-filled fude into the water and spread it into a circle, creating your own complex and unique patterns by blowing and fanning the surface of the water. Finally, you will capture the marble pattern with locally-produced washi.

What is Soba?

The meal you cook yourself is more delicious! Let's try making **Soba** noodles.

Soba is a Japanese noodle which is made from buck-wheat flour and has a



long history in Japanese food culture. Fukui is famous for oroshi-soba. It is one of our soul foods of Fukui because the Japanese emperor praised it when he came to Fukui. Oroshi is grated Japanese radish, and it is used as a topping on the noodles. Echizen Soba Club is a great place to learn how to make soba. The staff in Echizen Soba Club are professional amateurs but making soba is their hobby and they love it. They are very friendly and good at teaching how to make soba, so you do not have to worry if you have never made soba. In addition, you can learn Fukui dialect from them!

Mizuyokan

What is Mizuyokan?

Mizuyokan is a Japanese traditional sweet jelly made from azuki beans, water, and sugar – and you can make it at Echizen Soba no Sato. What is unique about mizuyokan in Fukui is that people eat it in winter while it is usually eaten in summer. They do this because of the large amount of snowfall Fukui receives every year. Even before refrigeration, it was easy to keep cool. This is one of the reasons why eating mizuyokan in winter spread to Fukui. Also, it is more affordable than other sweets. Mizuyokan in Fukui includes more water and tastes softer and lighter than usual. You can purchase it at many places such as supermarkets and convenience stores within Fukui. Now that you're in Fukui, you can try to make your own!
